

The Prophet Jeremiah

- Born in approximately 643 BC
- Began his ministry in 627 BC when he was 16 years old
- Lived in the Southern Kingdom called Judah

Context: Why Jeremiah Wrote

- 722 BC Assyrian army conquered the Northern Kingdom of Israel. Vast numbers of people were killed and the remaining residents marched into exile to Nineveh.
- Judah (Southern Kingdom) was allowed to exist another 100 years, although the Assyrians controlled the land.
- 627 BC Babylonians staged a revolt against the Assyrians, setting off a chain reaction leading the Assyrian empire to fall and the Babylonian empire to rise.
- The Babylonian army did not invade Judah. For first time in 100 years, Judah was free.
- Josiah, new king of Judah, sought to turn Judah back to God.
- Jeremiah knew God would not tolerate His people worshipping idols and if they failed to worship God alone, invasion was inevitable.
- 586 BC Babylonian army laid siege to Jerusalem for 18 months, finally breeching the walls. They tore down the Temple, burned homes and businesses, killed the king and marched the remaining citizens to exile in Babylon.

Jeremiah 31:31-34 (NIV)

"The days are coming," declares the LORD, "when I will make a new covenant with the people of Israel and with the people of Judah. ³² It will not be like the covenant I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to lead them out of Egypt, because they broke my covenant, though I was a husband to them," declares the LORD.

³³ "This is the covenant I will make with the people of Israel after that time," declares the LORD. "I will put my law in their minds and write it on their hearts. I will be their God, and they will be my people. ³⁴ No longer will they teach their neighbor, or say to one another, 'Know the LORD,' because they will all know me, from the least of them to the greatest," declares the LORD. "For I will forgive their wickedness and will remember their sins no more."
