# Jesus Is Arrested

After he said these things, Jesus went out with his disciples and crossed over to the other side of the Kidron Valley. He and his disciples entered a garden there. <sup>2</sup> Judas, his betrayer, also knew the place because Jesus often gathered there with his disciples. <sup>3</sup> Judas brought a <u>company of soldiers</u> and some guards from the chief priests and Pharisees. They came there carrying lanterns, torches, and weapons. <sup>4</sup> Jesus knew everything that was to happen to him, so he went out and asked, "Who are you looking for?"

<sup>5</sup> They answered, "Jesus the Nazarene."

He said to them, "<u>I Am</u>." (Judas, his betrayer, was standing with them.) <sup>6</sup> When he said, "I Am," <u>they shrank</u> back and fell to the ground.

## The Trial: Jesus Stands Before Pilate

Pilate went back into the palace. He summoned Jesus and asked, "Are you the king of the Jews?"

<sup>34</sup> Jesus answered, "Do you say this on your own or have others spoken to you about me?"

<sup>35</sup> Pilate responded, "I'm not a Jew, am I? Your nation and its chief priests handed you over to me. What have you done?"

<sup>36</sup> Jesus replied, "<u>My kingdom doesn't originate from this world</u>. If it did, my guards would fight so that I wouldn't have been arrested by the Jewish leaders. My kingdom isn't from here."

<sup>37</sup> "So you are a king?" Pilate said.

Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. I was born and came into the world for this reason: to testify to the truth. Whoever accepts the truth listens to my voice."

John 18:33-37 (CEB)

#### What we know

- I. John's account of Jesus' trials differs from Matthew, Mark & Luke.
- 2. John tells us that Jesus appeared briefly before Annas (the former High Priest) and Caiaphas (the current High Priest).
- 3. John does not mention Jesus appearing before the Sanhedrin at all.
- 4. Jesus claims to be "King of the Jews."
- 5. Jesus was on trial before Pilate for insurrection—a capital offense.
- 6. Jesus said that His kingdom "did not originate from this world."
- 7. Pilate found no reason to execute Jesus, but caved to the crowd.
