# October 11, 2015 Pastor John Speight Good News for Homeless Beggars

## Luke 18:35-43 (NIV)

As Jesus approached Jericho, a blind man was sitting by the roadside begging. <sup>36</sup> When he heard the crowd going by, he asked what was happening. <sup>37</sup> They told him, "Jesus of Nazareth is passing by."

- <sup>38</sup> He called out, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!"
- <sup>39</sup> Those who led the way rebuked him and told him to be quiet, but he shouted all the more, "Son of David, have mercy on me!"
- <sup>40</sup> Jesus stopped and ordered the man to be brought to him. When he came near, Jesus asked him, <sup>41</sup>
- "What do you want me to do for you?"
- "Lord, I want to see," he replied.
- <sup>42</sup> Jesus said to him, "Receive your sight; your faith has healed you."
- <sup>43</sup> Immediately he received his sight and followed Jesus, praising God. When all the people saw it, they also praised God.

#### What Have We Learned So Far?

- Out of all the gospels, Luke consistently points to Jesus' concern for those who live on the fringe of society.
- In chapter 2, Luke tells us God personally invited a group of shepherds to be the first to come hold His newborn Son. Luke also tells us the shepherds were the first to announce the birth of lesus to others.
- In chapter 5, Luke tells us that Jesus "grabbed" and healed an outcast man suffering from leprosy.
- In chapter 8, Luke tells us that Jesus sailed through a storm in order to get to and heal an outcast man who was demon possessed.
- In chapter 7, Luke tells us that a prostitute entered a house where Jesus was having dinner. Seeing her faith, Jesus forgave her and announced that her faith had saved her.
- Luke demonstrates that the heart and character of God is His concern for the oppressed, the outcast, the least, last, lonely and lost.
