What We've Learned

- From Moses' birth we saw the heroic actions of his mother and two Hebrew midwives who saved Moses from death.
- Moses went from "fear to faith" following his escape from Egypt and his face-to-face encounter with God at the Burning Bush.
- Moses confronted the Pharaoh and led the Israelites out of Egypt and through the Sea of Reeds into the Wilderness.
- On Mount Sinai God gave Moses the Ten Commandments, defining their relationship with God and God's relationship with them.
- In the Wilderness, God taught Moses the principles of effective leadership.

The Timeline

- 3 months—From Egypt to Mount Sinai
- II months—Camped at Mount Sinai
- 38 years—at Kadesh Barnea

The Majority Opinion: Numbers 13:27–28, 31–33 (NLT)
