

# Matthew 4:18-22 (NLT)

One day as Jesus was walking along the shore of the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers—Simon, also called Peter, and Andrew—throwing a net into the water, for they fished for a living. Jesus called out to them, "Come, follow me, and I will show you how to fish for people!" And they left their nets at once and followed him.

A little farther up the shore he saw two other brothers, James and John, sitting in a boat with their father, Zebedee, repairing their nets. And he called them to come, too. They immediately followed him, leaving the boat and their father behind.

# Understanding the Biblical Story

## Verse 18

One day as Jesus was walking along the shore of the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers—Simon, also called Peter, and Andrew—throwing a net into the water, for they fished for a living.

- Jesus had previously made Galilee his base of operations, living in Capernaum during this story (Matthew 4:12–13).
- The Sea of Galilee is the center of life in Galilee, roughly 13 miles long from north to south and 8 miles across from east to west. The sea was thick with fishing boats in Jesus' day.
- Peter and Andrew used a casting net (also known as the *amphiblestron*), which was circular and as large as 9 feet across. Weighted with pellets of lead, it would sink into the water, catching fish as it descended and was drawn to shore.

## Verse 19

Jesus called out to them, "Come, follow me, and I will show you how to fish for people!"

- It was Jewish custom for potential disciples to approach rabbis and apply to become their pupils. Jesus chooses them.
- Following rabbis typically meant becoming a scholar, specifically in the Law. However, Jesus calls his disciples to be heralds and multipliers of God's Kingdom.
- Disciples of Jewish rabbis normally continued their trades, but Jesus wants his disciples to be with him full-time.

## Verse 20

And they left their nets at once and followed him.

- Why would they do this? The Gospel of John seems to indicate they had prior contact with Jesus. But that might be missing the point this story is making.
- People become believers by the power of Jesus' word. They follow him because he has spoken to them, and his word generates faith.
- The church comes into being in response to Christ's own word. That is the miracle in this story and why the apparent lack of prior contact enhances the message.

Verse 21

A little farther up the shore he saw two other brothers, James and John, sitting in a boat with their father, Zebedee, repairing their nets. And he called them to come, too.

- Mark's Gospel reports that there were hired men in the boat with Zebedee.
- Typically, there were three types of people who would fit under the category of fishermen in Jesus' day:
  - > Tax collectors who sold fishing rights to businessmen.
  - > People who owned/leased boats and employed day laborers.
  - > A seasonal day laborer.
- The sons of Zebedee were likely in the second category.

## Verse 22

They immediately followed him, leaving the boat and their father behind.

- We often look at the disciples following Jesus as an abandonment of their former occupation. For some of us, that is true, but for others it means abandoning our former motivations.
- The image of fishing was often used in other faiths' traditions as an illustration of calling people to a new life, to participate in their god's own saving work.

# Five Qualities of Good Fishermen

- I. Patience

- 3. Courage
  - We need to be willing to tell the truth, sharing the gospel and acting on it despite opposition.
- 4. An eye for the right moment
  - We must be discerning, understanding there is a time to speak and a time to stay silent.
- 5. The ability to keep out of sight
  - We must get out of the way, presenting Jesus Christ rather than ourselves by our words and deeds.

#### **Come and Fish**

Come: No matter where you are in your faith. No matter what your occupation happens to be. You have a unique circle of influence and experiences that will speak into somebody's life.

Fish: Invest in those around you. Support them and help them see where God may be inviting them to grow in their faith. Help each other become better disciples. Be a kingdom multiplier.
